

## Animal Aid has filmed undercover in farms throughout the UK

Some farms were randomly chosen. Others were visited because they operated to 'high welfare' standards or they were run by industry leaders. This is what we found:

- At ten pig farms owned or run by directors of the industry's marketing board, we filmed pregnant and nursing sows incarcerated in narrow metal crates; dead, sick and dying piglets littering the pens; and animals wading through filth or living in utterly barren environments.
- Freedom Food is the RSPCA's farm assurance and labelling scheme, under which animals are said to be provided with 'a stimulating environment that enables [them] to exhibit their natural behaviour'. However, at a Somerset Freedom Food farm, we found a large number of lame, starving, dead and dying broiler chickens inside a vast windowless unit that held 30,000 birds.

- At a Dorset goat farm, a mother lay dead on the shed floor with a bullet in her head. Her young kid huddled beside her body. A second shot goat lay alongside the pair. The farm, whose milk and cheese were sold by leading supermarkets, kept all the goats confined all year round – a system known as 'zero grazing'.
- Zero grazing is increasingly common on larger dairy farms. At four such operations, we filmed cows crowded together in the gloom, with evidence of emaciation and disease. At one farm, two cows and a young calf had been shot and dumped outside.
- At a Devon farm rearing turkeys for the Christmas market, we filmed inside a barn holding hundreds of birds. Many were covered in muck, and were feather-pecked and suffered from deformed feet and legs. Some were so ill that they couldn't raise themselves from the filthy floor. On top of the feed bins lay long-dead birds.

## Sheep face different hardships...

The farming press reported that in the spring of 2013 more than 100,000 sheep and lambs died in the freezing conditions and heavy snow that covered the UK countryside, whilst many more faced starvation stranded in fields.

These are examples of why a growing number of people believe that it is wrong to mass-produce, kill and eat animals.
